Fearing she would live the rest of her life and die at the kennels, we convinced a very nice family into taking her in ADDITION to the dog they wanted to adopt. That was

not in anyone's best interest and Sapphire was back very soon, invisible again. To make matters worse, we forgot to put her picture and information back on the website as available. Now, without a doubt, Sapphire was truly and forever 'invisible' to the world.

Then Christmas Eve 2004, "Coincidence" changed her life forever. Someone 500 miles away actually SAW her AND they saw her on the internet!! On the website where we accidentally **no longer had her listed!!!!** How could this be?? Coincidence?

What force made Sapphire invisible for so long and WHY? What force kept her in rescue for almost 3 long years? What force popped up a long inactive web link? Hmmm??

Again this last year I have noticed a trend, which breaks my heart. We seem to consistently receive dogs in the rescue whose owners have died and made no arrangements for their animals. Perhaps they thought friends or family would surely take in the dog, but never specifically asked them. Perhaps the owners were young and never considered that something may happen to them. Too often these dogs are middle aged and local shelters will frequently not put those dogs up for adoption. RockySpot Rescue can only take in as many dogs as we have foster homes for, a number which is highly insufficient. This often means these wonderful and well-loved animals are put to sleep for the crime of having an owner who didn't plan for them. PLEASE take the time to ask someone to take each and every one of your animals. Place this name and number with your will and make sure it stays updated. Check with these people yearly to make sure they are still willing and able to take in your animals as people's lives and situations do change. We suggest you make provisions in your will for the animal's care. It would be terrible if the new home had to give them up simply due to the increase in financial burden. Finally, make sure a nearby friend or family member has a key to your house to gain timely access to your pets. Our animals depend on us not only to take care of them while we are living, but also to continue to do so after we are gone. For all they bring to our lives, it is a small gift in return.

Housetraining

Because dogs are denning animals, they do not like to soil their surroundings. However, adult dogs or puppies will need some time to discover that an entire house is now their den. Puppies cannot be expected to control their bladder and bowels for long periods of time until five to six months of age. Many adult dogs adopted from the shelter were housetrained in previous homes. After being sheltered in an environment where they have soiled their surroundings, they will require some "reminder" training. For the first few days, you should assume your new dog is not housetrained.

Establish a Routine

If fed on a routine schedule, your dog is more likely to eliminate regularly. This will make it easier for your puppy or dog to learn the acceptable behavior.

Reward Good Behavior

Take your puppy or dog outside frequently, at least every two hours. Make sure to let your dog out within 20 minutes of naps, playing and eating. Provide lots of praise and give your pup a small food treat after eliminating outside.

Never Punish after the Fact

Animals do not understand punishment after the fact - even if it is only seconds afterward. If you catch your canine in the act of house soiling, startle the dog or puppy. Make sure the dog believes this alarm is coming from the environment and not from you (whistle, slap the wall, toss a pillow). Do not hit dogs or puppies or rub their noses in the mess. This may cause them to become frightened of you and afraid to eliminate in your presence.

Use Enzymatic Cleaners

Dogs tend to reuse the same spot for house soiling. Neutralize all odors from accidents with an enzymatic cleaner. If you run out of enzyme cleaners, try white vinegar and water. Do not use ammonia because it smells similar to urine. If your dog continues to use the spot, make it less appealing by changing the texture. Cover it with plastic or with tape that is sticky on both sides.

Basic Rules for Dogs



Newspapers: If you have to go to the bathroom while playing in the front yard, always use the newspaper that's placed in the driveway every morning for that purpose.
